The Parables

There are numerous parables in the Old and New Testaments. Basically a Parable is a comparison of two things, often done through a story that has two meanings. Christ did much of his teaching in parables. Reportedly they were used in the Old Testament because the Rabbi could hold the attention of the people better with a story. I have only done some of them for devotionals but they are all listed for your information. Some are only a couple verses; some are quite lengthy.

According to Scripture, Christ chose to use parables or stories to help the people, including the disciples, understand more fully what He was trying to tell them. Many times they seemed to be confused just as we are today. References to why Christ used parables are found in Mark 4:10-12, Matthew 13:10-17, and Luke 8:9-10. Of the four Gospel writers, Luke records the most parables, followed by Matthew, and then Mark. Interestingly, John does not record any of the parables in his Gospel.

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
